General Instructions

Today you will be taking the Reading Criterion-Referenced Competency Test. The Reading test consists of two different types of questions. Some of the questions are multiple-choice. Others are open-ended. Samples have been included for both types of questions. The samples will show you the different types of questions on the test and how to write or mark your answers.

There are several important things to remember.

- Read each selection carefully.
- Read each question carefully and think about the answer. You may look back to the reading selection as often as necessary.
- Answer all questions in your Student Response Booklet. Do not write any answers to questions in your test booklet.
- For each multiple-choice question, choose the best answer and fill in the circle in the space provided in your Student Response Booklet.
- For each open-ended question, write the best answer in the space provided in your Student Response Booklet. Be sure to answer all parts of the question. If the question asks you to explain how or why you reached a conclusion, you must do so. If examples are requested, you must provide them. You should show all of your work. Write your answers neatly and clearly. Again, do not write any answers to questions in your test booklet.
- If you do not know the answer to a question, skip it and go on. You may return to it later if you have time.
- If you finish any part of the test that you are currently working on early, you may review your answers in that part only. You may not go on to the next part of the test.

Delivering the Mail

Many people think that the pony express was the earliest mail delivery service, but stagecoaches carried the mail first. The pony express carried only light mail (short messages and letters). This delivery system lasted only two years because telegraph lines were built and short messages no longer had to be carried as mail. However, stagecoaches continued to carry heavier mail because they still had passengers to keep their business alive. Later, railroads were built and trains took over the job of carrying the mail. Even mail delivery by railroad was replaced in part by the airplane.

Mary Cassatt: American Artist

By the young age of sixteen, Mary Cassatt had decided she wanted to become an artist. Unlike the other women painters of the time, she did not want to be merely an amateur; she wanted to make a living with her art. From 1860–1862, Mary studied drawing at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, which was near her home. What she really wanted to do, however, was go to Europe to study the work of famous painters, known as the “old masters.”

At first, Mary’s parents were opposed to the idea of her going to Europe, but she eventually changed their minds. Mary moved to Paris when she was 22 years old. After studying the old masters for a while, she began to believe that if she was to become a good artist, she would have to develop her own style.

In the early 1870s, the painter Edgar Degas asked Mary to join the group called the Impressionists. The Impressionists were a group of painters who had broken from the style of the old masters. Rather than painting only posed models, like other painters, the Impressionists often painted from real life. Rather than painting in only dark colors, the Impressionists experimented with bright colors and the effect of light on color.

Mary Cassatt became quite successful as an Impressionist painter. In later years, however, she also worked in dry point, a kind of printmaking. The process of dry point consisted of three steps. The first step was to draw a picture. She did this by scratching a sharp needle onto a sheet of copper, called a plate. Next she applied ink to the plate with a roller. Then she pressed the plate onto a sheet of paper. The finished picture looks like a drawing, but it is actually made up of hundreds of tiny lines. Even later, Mary Cassatt began painting pictures of mothers with their children. These are some of Cassatt’s most well-known paintings. In the 1890s, Mary Cassatt had many one-woman art shows in both the United States and Europe. Her work was well respected and sold very well. She bought a summer home in the country outside of Paris, where she lived until her death in 1926.

Would you ever leave home and move somewhere few people have ever been? Read the passage below about the westward movement. Answer the questions that follow.

Life on the Prairie

From the 1870s through the 1900s, there was a popular movement to move to and settle in the Western frontier. There were several reasons why people chose to leave the comfort and security of their home in the East in favor of the uncertain living conditions and unfamiliar surroundings of frontier life. Families moved West, despite the dangers, for many reasons. Some wanted the chance to own a home; others hoped to own a farm. Some traveled for the adventure.

Everyone—men, women, and children—had to make lifestyle adjustments during the trek out to their particular destination. Regardless of age or gender, all families had to walk or ride fifteen to sixteen hours a day. Families generally traveled in caravans of covered wagons with teams of horses. They traveled on land that was often rocky and dry or covered with tall prairie grass. These brave adventurers rode across mountains that often became extremely cold at night, such as the Rocky Mountains, or across streams with currents swift and dangerous, or deep and calm. Everyone had their particular jobs to perform while on their journey across the United States.

The main concerns of the men were providing their families with food, transporting their families across the wilderness, and protecting them. Most men typically awoke at 4:00 A.M. to get the wagons ready for the day's travel. Men made the decisions whether or not to continue traveling and when it was best to stop and settle on the spot.

Life for most women traveling on the prairie was rather lonely. Women had little or no time for social activities. Life revolved around tending to one's family, making meals, and washing clothing. All of these tasks were completed under difficult circumstances. After preparing the breakfast early in the morning and then traveling, women had to prepare the midday meal for their families. After traveling all afternoon and evening, women made the final evening meal before everyone settled to sleep for the night.

Children had several important tasks as part of this traveling unit. They were often responsible for finding wood or other sources of fuel for making dinner and then creating the campfire for preparing the meal. Children also were responsible for bringing water to the camp. This might mean walking long distances to get the water and bringing it back to the campsite.

These caravans of brave, adventurous people sought a better life. They hoped that somewhere out West they would reach their dreams. Each family proved its courage and determination by making the dream a reality.

How to Build a Small Animal Cage

A small animal, like a hamster or a lizard, is very entertaining to watch as it leads its busy life. One way to make viewing easier is to construct a small animal cage out of Plexiglas. There are three stages to this project: 1) drawing the plans; 2) having the Plexiglas cut; and 3) assembling the pieces.

To draw the plans, you will need the usual drawing supplies, such as paper, pencil, and ruler. First, decide on a size which you think will be adequate for housing your pet. Think about how much the animal may grow in the next year or so, and be sure that you plan the size of the cage to be large enough. Next, draw out the dimensions you want for four sides and a bottom. You will need all of your math skills to plan this correctly. Plexiglas that is one-quarter inch thick is usually sturdy enough for most small animals. (The top will need to be made of a material which will allow oxygen to enter the cage. Often an adjustable window screen, like those sold in hardware stores, is perfect.)

Once your plans are on paper, you will want to take them with you to the hardware store to purchase the Plexiglas and have it cut to your measurements. It is a good idea to fit the pieces together before you leave the store, in case you need to make some slight adjustments. The Plexiglas can be re-cut at the store if necessary before you bring it home.

At home, you will need to cut strips of duct tape to tape the sides and bottom of the cage together on the outside. The sides and bottom should fit very snugly together with no gaps, so that the animal cannot escape or gnaw at the duct tape. Line the bottom with whatever material is recommended for your pet. Place the adjustable screen over the top, and your pet's new home is ready to use. Be sure to put a brick or two on top of the screen to prevent escapes.

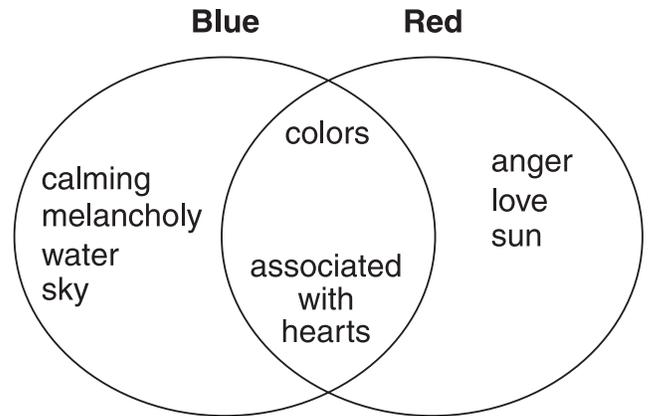
